GENERAL INFORMATION

LOCATION

Romania is located in the southeastern part of Central Europe, covering **238,397** km². This makes up about **4.8% of Europe's land area** and **5.4% of the European Union's territory**. With this size, Romania is the **13th largest country in Europe**. Its location places it at the meeting point between Western and Eastern Europe, shaping its culture, history, and role as a bridge between different region.




AREA

Romania covers a total area of **238,397 km²**, making it one of the largest countries in Central and Eastern Europe. Its diverse landscape includes vast plains, rolling hills, towering mountains, and a stretch of coastline along the Black Sea. This varied terrain not only shapes the country's natural beauty but also influences its climate, economy, and way of life.



POPULATION

According to data from Eurostat, on January 1, 2024, the population of Romania numbered 19,064,409, which represents a small uptick of around 9,900 people since the same time last year. Nevertheless, this slight uptick is at odds with the more substantial demographic movements we've observed in recent decades. Migration and a falling birth rate have conspired to produce a not-so-steady decline in the overall number of people living in this country. Romania's population density is about 80 people per square kilometer, which translates into an appearance of humanity pretty much wherever one goes.



The Romanian emblem

- The emblem of Romania, adapted by the two Chambers of Parliament, reunited in the session of September 10, 1992, consists of an eagle, on a shield, with its wings spread. It holds a cross in its beak, on its head the Steel Crown of Romania, and in its claws a sword and a scepter. Between the protective wings there is a shield divided into five parts comprising the coats of arms of the 5 historical regions: Tara Românească, Dobrogea, Oltenia, Moldova and Transylvania.
- The current coat of arms is based on the interwar coat of arms of Romania, which was designed in 1921 by the Cluj heraldist József Sebestyén, at the request of King Ferdinand I of Romania. The current coat of arms lacks, compared to the interwar coat of arms, the small, silver-black shield inside (the heraldic symbol of the House of Hohenzollern). The cross above the crown was not a simple cross, but was the cross of the "Crossing the Danube" decoration.
- In the current republican coat of arms, the graphic representation of the scepter held in the claws of the Roman eagle is not the traditional one, with the end in the shape of a lily flower (fleur-de-lys a royal symbol originating from the French tradition, which is found in most coats of arms of the world, including the interwar coat of arms of the Kingdom of Romania), but is still reminiscent of that of the "presidential scepter" received as a gift by President Nicolae Ceauşescu from the Grand National Assembly, during the communist period (1974).



The Romanian hymn: "Deșteaptă-te, române!"

Since 1848, "Deșteaptă-te, române!" (Wake up, Romanian!) has been a song very dear to the Romanians due to the message of patriotism and freedom it carries. It was sung on the occasion of every conflict in Romania, inspiring them with courage at crucial moments in history, such as the War of Independence (1877 - 1878), the First and Second World Wars. Especially during the crisis after the coup d'état of August 23, 1944, this anthem was spontaneously sung by everyone and broadcast on all radio stations.

On the day of the uprising from Braşov, on November 15, 1987, workers from the Autocamioane factories began to sing this song, many of them no longer understanding the lyrics. However, the song continued without interruption.

On December 22, 1989, during the Romanian Revolution of 1989, the anthem rose in the streets, accompanying the huge masses of people, dispelling the fear of death and uniting the entire people in the noble feelings of the moment. Thus, its establishment as a national anthem came naturally, imposing itself universally, without hesitation, under the formidable pressure of the demonstrators and replacing the old anthem "Trei culori" (Three colours).


Major Rivers

- 2-Olt River and Mureş River

Famous People from Romania



Traditional Romanian Foods




The Romanian Revolution


